

ELENA COMAY DEL JUNCO ON CATALINA SCHLIEBENER MUÑOZ AT BUREAU OF GENERAL SERVICES – QUEER DIVISION, NEW YORK

Since 2019, Catalina Schliebener Muñoz has been rearranging popular imagery from Disney's universe of children's entertainment in their ongoing series Satanic Panic. While the title refers to the moral panic of the 1980s, which emanated from the United States and impacted the artist's own childhood in Chile, the show of the same name also touches on its echoes in the contemporary United States. Disney stands accused by right-wing ideologues of abandoning "family values" in its explicit embrace of LGBTQIA communities, with the company's criticism of Florida's discriminatory "Don't Say Gay" laws and the ensuing backlash being a prominent example. In her review of Schliebener Muñoz's exhibition, Elena Comay del Junco analyzes the colorful collages and murals in both their political and art historical contexts.












COLLAGISM

"Collagism" aims to explore the state of international contemporary collage practice. The call to artists generated submissions from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom, Italy, Greece, Indonesia, Germany, Iran, the Netherlands, Australia, Taiwan, Pen, Romania, France, Exph and many more countries around the world. The scope of submissions ranged from classical analogue collage to the most cutting-edge digital, video, sculptural, and other experimental forms of the medium.

Christian Julien Stroyt, Curator at Museum Stathrey-Caradoc, has one been interested in collage, the studied the Dadastis and their early collage practices and wanted to contextualize "collage today" with a contemporary international exhibition in a public gallery. This exhibit is a small sampling of the submissions received. With the constant evolution of technology, definitions of what "collage" is become increasingly difficult to define. This exhibition hopes to contribute to the conversation of what collage is, and how its practificness service.

"Collagism: A Survey of Contemporary Collage" was presented at-Museum Strathroy-Caradoc in Strathroy, Ontario, from 1 July to 1 August 2016. This Exhibition-In-Print is a brief selection of collage from the exhibition.

Catalina Schliebener is a Buenos Aires-based Chilean artist. Her "Colouring Book" series combines collage, ink and varnish on paper, producing chaotic scenes on sparse backgrounds. Disembodied limbs are re-animated with detailed cross-hatching—lines of ink evoke this classic cartooning technique, complimenting the cartoons yalve of the collaged colouring book elements. The playful qualities of the figures, designed in such a way for their intended child-age primary audience, are retained despite the violent and disjointed manner in which Schliebener reassembles them. KVRN by Gabriella Garcia

KVRM by the São Paulo, Brasil-based artist Gabriella Garcia (COLIA 60) is a study in contrasts. An abstract, bright-red geometric structure stands in stark contrast against a muted black and white landscape of stones and brush. The mysterious object resembles something from the future transposed to an ancient, natural setting, not unlike the monibili in Stanley Kurbirck's 2001: A Space Odyssey (1968). The scene of KVRM, its titled also resembling out of science (fiction, is calm, but foreboding. What is this red object? What is KVRM?

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
